In Colombia since April 28th, social protests started all over the country. One of the main reasons was the tax reform and health reform law proposals that the government was trying to push through the congress. Although initially the strike committee, university students and other people were only trying to persuade the government to not present these reforms. Day after day the demonstrators discovered and added more reasons to continue protesting.

More than 40 days of mobilisations have been completed in the main cities of Colombia. Unfortunately, all the protests have not been peaceful, the police have used excessive force, lethal weapons and other measures that have been against the rights of the protesters. The protests have left people seriously injured, forcibly disappeared, women raped, dead people and towns and cities roads cut off of for weeks.

Social protests broke out in Colombia on 28 April 2021, they were initially triggered by tax reforms, structural inequality and poverty, as well as, other underlying grievances including the lack of implementation of the Peace Accord, the number of social leaders being killed and failure to address previous grievances from national strikes held in 2019 and 2020. Public Statements
